- And We Are Not Saved: A History of The Movement as People. By Debbie Louis. Garden City, New York: Doubleday & Company, Inc. 1970. xi + 462 pages. \$7.95. This book is a study of the civil rights movement of the sixties. Beginning with a discussion of the mood of the fifties that gave rise to the movement and the persons who made up the movement, the author follows the movement as it developed and, finally, deals with the growth of black power, student radicalism and the Vietnam protests.
- Basic Issues in American Public Policy. Edited by George S. Masannat. Boston, Massachusetts: Holbrook Press, Inc. 1970. xii + 526 pages. \$5.50. This book, through probing articles by noted individuals, focuses on the content of public policy, with the aim of furthering discussion around major issues facing our society, such as: the politics of democracy; the substance of public policy (including government as it relates to the economy, business and labor); the general welfare (poverty, housing, education and health); the urban crisis; violence and disorder; government and science; and the United States in the world arena.
- COMMUNITY CONTROL: THE BLACK DEMAND FOR PARTICIPATION IN LARGE AMERICAN CITIES. By Alan A. Altshuler. New York, New York: Pegasus. 1970. xii + 238 pages. \$6.95. This book, the first volume in Pegasus' series on Decentralization and Urban Crisis, analyzes the controversy over community control of public services in the nation's ghettos. The author, after reviewing the arguments for and against community control, examines the historic background of the community control movement and considers the present trend toward ethnic militancy and the movement for greater participation in government.
- Environment: A Challenge for Modern Society. By Lynton Keith Caldwell. Garden City, New York: The Natural History Press. 1970. xviii + 292 pages. \$7.95. The author studies man's relationship with his environment and offers a logical approach to more effective management of the earth's resources.
- FOREIGN POLICY PRIORITIES: 1970-71. Prepared by the Editors of the Foreign Policy Association. New York, New York: The Macmillan Company. 1970. 96 pages. \$.95. This book analyzes major foreign policy issues facing the nation. The topics covered include priorities, Vietnam, the

- GI RIGHTS AND ARMY JUSTICE: THE DRAFTEE'S GUIDE TO MILITARY LIFE AND LAW. By Robert S. Rivkin. New York, New York: Grove Press, Inc. 1970. xxiv + 383 pages. \$1.75. This book, directed to the draftee, is not only a guide to GI rights and army justice, but also an introduction to military life in general.
- LEGAL FOUNDATIONS OF NURSING PRACTICE. By Irene A. Murchison and Thomas S. Nichols. New York, New York: The Macmillan Company. 1970. xxvi + 530 pages. \$8.95. This book presents an in-depth analysis of the legal principles underlying the nursing practice by focusing on the law as a science which utilizes behavioral sciences to formulate its principles and to give the nurse a rational basis for decision-making.
- ON INTELLECTUALS. Edited by Philip Rieff. Garden City, New York: Doubleday & Company, Inc. 1970. xiv + 380 pages. \$1.95. Through contributions by noted sociologists, this book re-defines the meaning of "intellectual" and discusses the role of the intellectual in contemporary society.
- ORDEAL OF AMBITION. By Jonathan Daniels. Garden City, New York: Doubleday & Company, Inc. 1970. x + 466 pages. \$8.95. Mr. Daniels examines the anatomy of antagonism that existed between Thomas Jefferson, Alexander Hamilton and Aaron Burr, in their bitter struggle for control of a young republic.
- THE LAW OF FRANCHISING. By Coleman R. Rosenfield. Rochester, New York: The Lawyers Co-operative Publishing Company. 1970. xiv + 482 pages. \$37.50. This book analyzes the law of franchising, including such topics as the history of franchising, the decision to franchise, negotiating the franchise, and termination.
- THE LAW RELATING TO ACTIVITIES OF MAN IN SPACE. By S. Houston Lay and Howard J. Taubenfeld. Chicago, Illinois: The University of Chicago Press. 1970. xii + 334 pages. \$17.50. The authors analyze both the existing laws, derived from treaties, customs, statutes or otherwise, with respect to man's activities in outer space and also the ways in which such law may develop in the future.
- THE MORALITY OF ABORTION: LEGAL AND HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVES. Edited by John T. Noonan, Jr. Cambridge, Massachusetts: Harvard University

Press. 1970. xvii + 276 pages. \$8.95. Through essays by theologians, historians and lawyers, this book analyzes and challenges the wisdom and constitutionality of the present trends in abortion law reform.

The Politics of Pollution. By J. Clarence Davies III. New York, New York: Pegasus. 1970. xii + 231 pages. \$6.00. Divided into three parts, this book analyzes our present environmental position and reviews the politics of pollution that have put us there. Part I describes the nature of the pollution problem, the growth of interest in environmental quality, and discusses the major pollution acts which have been passed by Congress and the controversies surrounding them. Part II deals with the forces that have shaped pollution policy (Congress, the Executive Branch, public opinion and interest groups, and state and local government). Part III examines the policy processes involved in controlling pollution and, after reviewing the policy processes, offers proposals for improvement.

THE PRESIDENT STEPS DOWN: A PERSONAL MEMOIR OF THE TRANSFER OF POWER. By George Christian. New York, New York: The Macmillan Company. 1970. 282 pages. \$6.95. Written by President Johnson's press secretary, this book analyzes the President's control over the government during his last three months in office.

Why Teachers Strike: Teachers' Rights and Community Control. Edited by Melvin I. Urofsky. Garden City, New York: Doubleday & Company, Inc. 1970. x + 349 pages. \$1.95. Through an analysis of the teachers' strike which took place in New York City in 1968, Professor Urofsky relates the central issue of that strike—community control—beyond local and educational boundaries by relating it to alienation, participatory democracy, the politics of confrontation, and conflicting civil rights.
